Identify

How to shape future leaders

Identify: Adopt the eyes of Christ to see the potential around you.

Initiate: Time to engage. The first thing great leaders do is prepare their replacements.

Invest: Provide constant encouragement, feedback, and counsel. one who may be hurting, lonely or lost?" Similarly, when you look out across your base, attend chapel or church, or gather for fellowship, what do you see? Do you see the next fellowship leader or your eventual replacement? Initiate

As you identify our future leaders, it's now time to engage. A leader I highly respected once asked me, "When you see an airman or a second lieutenant, what do you see? Someone needing lots of direction—or a future leader?" Instead of a young airman or lieutenant, he saw a future chief master sergeant, colonel, even a general. And he immediately put a plan in place to prune and grow that emerging leader.

I learned then that the first thing great leaders do is prepare their replacements, such as Paul did with Timothy by providing opportunities for growth: "But you know that Timothy has proved

himself, because as a son with his father he has served with me in the work of the gospel" (Philippians 2:22).

Invest

Once you've identified and initiated, now comes the hard part—it's time to invest. Joy beyond compare: When we will finally see His face

ew experiences in my life will ever compare to the moment when my husband came home from his first one-year deployment.

Since he was among the last groups returning home, the anticipation of his impending arrival was more intense than anything I'd ever felt before. I could barely relax, let alone sleep. It was heart-wrenching having to wait while watching others welcome their soldier back home before I did mine.

But the day finally came.

White sheets scrawled with hand-painted welcome messages lined the route from the airport to post. In a town affected by the absence of so many soldiers, their families relying on the generosity and support of the community during this trying time, these signs were more than just a greeting. They were significant reminders to all of the cost of sacrifice paid by our military and their families.

The gym was packed wall-to-wall with men, women, and children who had staked out their spots well ahead of time. Buses full of soldiers escorted from the airport by the police, sirens and all, finally rolled onto post hours later. Lee Greenwood's patriotic "Proud to be an American" song began playing and tears started flowing.

The 300 returning warriors broke through

the special-effects fog mixed with spotlights, greeted by deafening cries, screams, whistles and clapping. All the pent-up emotions came crashing down, colliding with the upwelling joy and relief of seeing our brave men and women march into view. Quieting down for our national anthem, we could hardly contain our excitement during the thirty-second speech by the post commander and the chaplain's prayer expressing our hearts' relief. Then we were dismissed. The somewhat organized chaos that ensued can be likened to the penguins' return in the "March of the Penguins" film—only here were seemingly endless waves of desert camouflage and loved ones rushing to unite with one another.

I had hoped to spot my husband from my vantage point on the bleachers before he spotted me. More like magnetic force than vision, we found ourselves suddenly locked in each other's arms. I will never forget the feelings in my heart as we embraced—the look on his face and the smell of Iraq! All the grinding work and dust clung to these soldiers throughout their cramped, two-day journey home.

We had survived one of the most trying years of our lives. Now there was so much of our hearts to talk about, rediscover, and

Months prior to this homecoming, Chris Rice's song "Smile" spoke to me not only of the moment when I would finally see

my husband, but also gave me a glimpse of heaven when we are finally reunited with our one true love, Jesus Christ. As my heart ached to see my husband's face, so too is the spiritual ache in our hearts to see our welcoming Christ, and experience the joy of unity and fullness of heart we will have in


eternity with Him. I imagine much of our time with the Lord in heaven will be spent rediscovering what was lost from the Fall in the Garden of Eden. Navy: Meet incoming Sailors/families...Remember the feelings and confusion experienced as a new arrival.

Air Force: Sponsors can help reduce anxiety...[of] a PCS move. ... A newcomer can reduce stress by talking to someone "already there."



FIVE MYTHS of MORTGAGED RENTAL PROPERTY

Editor's Note: Frequent moves often involving quick decisions—such is the realm of our military and their families as they PCS across the globe. Captain Stark urges careful planning on what you may already be debating: whether to rent or purchase a home. Seek the counsel of your financial adviser or accountant.

If your military family is a typical one, chances are you have moved about once every two to three years. One of the most difficult decisions can be whether to buy a house or rent one.

The typical advice I've received throughout my career has been: buy a house and then rent it out when you move. The tenants will pay your mortgage, the house will gain value—it's a great investment. However, is that fundamentally sound advice? Would you buy a new car just because your neighbor said it's smart? No, you would do the math to determine if the car is affordable.

Biblical wisdom tells us "the borrower is slave to the lender" (Proverbs 22:7). By taking on debt in the form of a mortgage, we are introducing additional risk to our lives. Here are five common pitfalls associated with owning a rental property and some ways we can be wise stewards of the resources God has given us:

Myth 1: My tenants pay my mortgage

Many property owners mistakenly assume that as long as a tenant pays the mortgage, they're making money. In reality, after all other expenses—such as maintenance, insurance, taxes, and utilities—are added in, most owners actually lose money. These expenditures can easily cost the owner 30-40 percent of the mortgage cost, meaning you must charge a tenant 130 percent of your mortgage payment, which may not be possible in competitive rental markets.

Myth 2: I will have a tenant each month

You may plan for a tenant to cover all of your expenses, but it's a guarantee that your house will be unoccupied at some point. If a house sits empty for just a few months every couple of years, you could still be left with a big loss. Unless you're able to account for these losses over time, you could cumulatively lose thousands of dollars.

Myth 3: I should not pay extra on my mortgage because I can make more in the market

Would you rather have a paid-off rental property earning you \$1,000 a month or unpredictable mutual funds? Many people assume that by investing in the market, their

investments will increase the historical average of 11 percent a year—which is far from the case in today's economic climate. Your mortgage is costing you 4-8 percent interest every year. A house paid on schedule over thirty years can easily double the cost of the original sale price after interest is factored in, meaning thousands of dollars that will go to the bank rather than your pocket.

And it's important to remember—a paidoff property cannot be foreclosed on if your financial situation changes unexpectedly.

Myth 4: I can depreciate my rental property and take a tax deduction

You can deduct the "depreciation" of your house every year on your taxes. However, when you sell it you will also have to pay some of that back to the IRS because it now counts as income, which can cost a homeowner more than \$10,000 in taxes after the sale of a property.

Myth 5: I can deduct the interest from my mortgage on my taxes

This makes the least sense of all the myths.

You can indeed deduct a portion of your interest (interest x tax rate = deduction). But you are losing \$8,000 a year by essentially paying the bank \$10,000 a year to avoid paying the IRS \$2,000.

Investing in rental homes can be an excellent income, yielding significant returns, for the prudent ones willing to first save before buying, and then diligently devote all resources to paying off the debt as quickly as possible.

In addition to warnings about being a debtor, the Bible also instructs us about actually having the resources to finish what we start, "Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it?" (Luke 14:2).

ave you ever thought about the number of choices vou have? You could even describe life as a series of choiceswhere to live,

what profession to pursue, and whom to marry. Joshua posed the ultimate choice, "... then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve ... as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:15).

Once we are adopted into God's family, we face many more choices. The condition of our heart is going to greatly affect those decisions.

At OCF's White Sulphur Springs Conference Center there is a hillside where rock has been excavated for use around the property. Two kinds of rock predominate, shale and slate. From a few feet away these rocks look the same, but they are very different. Shale looks hard, but its sedimentary layers of clay and other materials quickly break into small shards and dust when picked up.

On the other hand, slate starts out as shale but is transformed by processes such as heat or pressure.



Points to ponder

- choice I'm facing now? Do I trust God to lead me to make the right choices?

Because of this change, slate is much more stable and able to be used for things-roofing, chalkboards, and floor tiles. Slate stays intact in your hand.

Shale and slate are metaphors for the life choices we face. On the surface shale and slate look the same, but choosing one or the other has vastly different results. We face the same dilemma when considering the investment of our time, treasure or talent. How do we decide which of those choices will yield lasting fruit and which will waste the valuable resources God has given us? We have to examine each choice carefully, just like I did when picking up those rocks.

I noticed something else while looking at the shale and slate. Shale has a smooth, attractive surface while the slate has marks left in it from the transformation process. I started to think how that resembles some of our choices. We may be drawn to the smooth and polished because it looks better, but frequently it's not the lasting choice.

Think about those transformation marks in the slate for a minute. Aren't you and I also being transformed? Don't we bear marks from that too? As we make choices, maybe we should look for "marks" or indicators that God is at work in one choice or the other.

Choices can seem to have little difference. Shale and slate

occur one on top of the other, and isn't that a lot like good and bad choices? They can seem almost the same, but if we dig deeper to evaluate each, we usually find the best choice down below, just as slate lies below shale.

Jesus challenged us to choose that which lasts. He told us about the man who built his house on a rock. (I don't think He was referring to shale!) He told us to lay up treasures in heaven where moth and rust can't destroy. Jesus says about choices, "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit-fruit that will last-and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you" (John

We need to consider our choices carefully because they have eternal consequences. Choose to build on the Rock, choose to lay up treasure in heaven, and choose to bear fruit that will last. Do as the Macedonians did-give yourself first to God. Then do what you sense is His leading. He will guide you as you grow more generous toward Him. "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." I invite you to join with me asking the Lord each day, "Lord, where is my heart today?" ≒≂

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
