Academies & ROTC prepare our OCF future leaders for a lifetime of Christian service: emboldened in their faith; equipped with tools to sustain them through the stresses of military service, and engaging the culture as they minister to their peers.

Education Centers are often the initial exposure to OCF at professional military education and training assignments. We equip and encourage members in their Christian faith and then send them out to operational assignments with a passion for living out their faith.

Family Ministry through Spiritually Smart Family conferences equips and encourages marriages and families through training and wise counsel, a spiritual triage helping families stay strong in Christ despite high OPTEMPO.

Regional Ministries are field ministries in "centers of mass" with multiple military installations in near proximity. They help members engage in partnership with chaplains, local churches and other military para-church ministries. Through spiritual and professional excellence, they thrive by providing Christ-centered lay leadership.

Conference Centers provide a safe place to find spiritual and physical refreshment, serving as the Fellowship's "living water." OCFers are emboldened, equipped, encouraged and engaged to shine the light of Christ in service, witness, and leadership.

**Lay Leaders** equip and encourage members to seek and pray for opportunities to make a difference through outreach and service.

Retirees and Veterans bring the skills, gifts, and wisdom gained through years of military service. They are invaluable to our active duty members, families, and ministries for wherever they have engaged ministries have flourished and younger members have grown.

During our junior year at the U.S. Naval Academy, my then-company mate and future husband invited me to a weekly OCF meeting, where I found several of my track teammates also attending. He continued inviting me, so we would meet up after dinner and walk together to the planetarium.

We officially started dating one month after attending an OCF retreat at White Sulphur Springs, married fifteen months later, and were then both assigned to the same duty station upon our commissioning. But because of our conflicting schedules, during the first two years of our marriage we were together less than six months.

Everything changed when my husband was given the opportunity to pursue his dream job. But I had no idea what I was in for. He would come home day after day, bruised and beaten up, utterly exhausted from the harsh training necessary for his job. The truth of his extreme occupation began to slowly sink in with me. The closer his graduation approached, the more I realized my need to prepare myself for what's ahead. I felt God prompting me out of my fears to search through His Word for His promises of comfort and hope, such as Psalm





## **UNITED STATES COAST GUARD ACADEMY**




CDR Hank and Betsy Teuton, USCG (Ret.)


Cadets are well prepared to lead small group Bible studies with their peers, having learned in OCF how to live in Christian community that serves others in their place within the military society.


CH(MAJ) Mark & Deb Benz, USA (Ret.)

The Council has also been working on two proposed changes to the Constitution and Bylaws. Members will be asked to vote in early 2013 to ensure:

• Full compatibility between the Constitution and Bylaws—that wherever a governing function is discussed, the language is consistent and not conflicting in both documents.

• The Constitution contains only governing principles, core values and ministry distinctives that are unlikely to change over time.

These "largely housekeeping" changes require an affirmative vote of the full membership. More details will follow as voting draws near.

## **Veterans Memorial Lodge construction under way**

A longstanding prayer of all Spring Canyon directors—Larry and Kay Banning, George and Dot Meadors, Tom and Sarah Hemingway, Ben and Terry Jordan and currently Dean and Sue Rizzo— has been to double Spring Canyon's ministry capacity with additional lodges. The ground-breaking gave OCF opportunity to celebrate all the Lord is doing and commit to the pursuit of His vision for OCF and its two conference centers.
